## ACTE Region V Outstanding Administrator of the Year DeLayne Havlovic, Omaha Public Schools



DeLayne Havlovic currently serves as the Curriculum Supervisor in the Omaha Public Schools for business, marketing, information technology, and health sciences. He is responsible for district wide implementation and continual development of curriculum and career pathways for these disciplines. He provides instructional coaching, curriculum support, evaluation, and professional development for 125 BMIT and Health Sciences teachers. ### ACTEN Post-Secondary Teacher of the Year

**Sheree Moser, University of Nebraska-Lincoln**

Sheree Moser is an Assistant Professor of Practice at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. She teaches within the department of Child, Youth, and Family Studies. Her lifelong

passion has been to improve the lives of all individuals and families and working with future teachers. Prior to teaching at UNL, Sheree was a curriculum specialist for Lincoln Public Schools. This experience gave her a unique perspective related to learning styles, designing curriculum, and exposure to a level of diversity not common within most secondary teaching. Her student teachers have commented that they appreciate the way she helps them navigate curriculum, share ideas for implementing lessons, and provide networking experiences within the FCS professional community. Sheree has been a member of ACTE and FCSTN since 1985. She has served as the president-elect, president, and past president of the Nebraska Association of Family and Consumer Sciences and the Family and Consumer Sciences Teachers of Nebraska. She is currently serving as the Newsletter Chair and Student Unit Chair of the organization. Sheree has published several articles, presented at many conferences, and served on a variety of committees for these organizations as well. 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**Outstanding Career and Technical Teacher of the Year

Cathy Kloch is a Family and Consumer Sciences teacher and FCCLA advisor at Alliance Public Schools. Cathy started the FCCLA chapter at Alliance in 1977. Her teaching philosophy is based on the fact that teachers need to treat every child with respect and the expectation that every student will live up to his/her potential. As an FCCLA advisor, she is constantly working to help her FCCLA members develop leadership and life skills, make decisions, become productive members of the community, and work together as a team. During those 39 years as an adviser, she has had many state officers and national competitors. Cathy has served on the State FCCLA board, is the FCS representative to the ACTEN board, and is the CTE Department Chair at Alliance High School. While on the ACTEN board, she has served on the Public Relations, Membership, Nominating, and Awards Committees. As department chair, she works with other teachers to identify needs that can be met by the Perkins Grant, possible class offerings, and keeping them apprised of decisions made in the DLT meetings. **ACTEN Outstanding Business Teacher of the Year

Perkins Grant Manager, Microsoft IT Academy Program Administrator, and Business Department Head. Tennille is a member of ACTE and the Nebraska State Business Education Association. In these professional organizations, she has served as the Business Representative to the ACTEN board and currently serves as the newsletter editor of NSBEA. As an FBLA adviser, she has served on the Nebraska FBLA Board of Directors. Tennille is a 10-year winner of the BEST Award for NSBEA. In 2007 she received the ACTEN New teacher of the Year Award. As an FBLA adviser, she facilitates and coaches the Nebraska FBLA Parliamentary Procedure Team. In her own local chapter, she has had numerous students qualify for national competition. On the state level, Tennille has been part of two standards writing teams for NDE. The courses she contributed to were Entrepreneurship and Information Technology. In the classroom, she works strongly to support career and technical education. Her school underwent a school improvement analysis for CTE. As a result, there is a new high school being built centered on a career field model. Tennille has been involved in the transition process by helping design the building, participating in planning committees, and assisting with professional development. She commits countless hours to students to ensure their success and her resume proves this."



**ACTEN Outstanding New Teacher of the Year  
Kelsey Kummer, Millard Public Schools**

Kelsey Kummer's path to a career as a Family and Consumer Sciences teacher began when she stepped into her first introduction course in 7<sup>th</sup> grade. Her high school education lead her to achieve success through FCCLA and eventually serving as a state officer. With these positive experiences in FCS, Kelsey decided a career in FCS Education would encompass her ideal career. Before her first teaching job, she attended the NCE Conference to earn her ServSafe Certification and participate in professional development to prepare her for the strenuous year ahead. While at the conference, another FCS teacher took her under her wing and encouraged her to be involved in her professional organizations. Kelsey now serves as the membership chair for FCSTN. **ACTEN Carl Perkins Community Service Award

Janelle Stansberry has been at Cedar Bluffs Public Schools for thirty years. She serves as the business instructor, career readiness counselor, technology coordinator, assistant track coach, and head volleyball coach. When she began her career at Cedar Bluffs, the district had six Apple II computers. Under her leadership and vision, the entire school is now in a 1:1 environment. Because of her outstanding instructional practices, she has received many awards including the Milken Family Foundation National Educator Award, the NSBEA Secondary Teacher of the Year, and the ACTEN Teacher of the Year. Janelle is a member of ACTE/ACTEN, the Nebraska State Business Education Association, and Delta Pi Epsilon. While in these organizations, she has held many leadership positions including serving as the Business Education Representative to the ACTEN board. Nine years ago, Ms. Stansberry encouraged the administration to allow her to charter a Future Business Leaders of America Chapter. Soon after chartering the FBLA Chapter, she began looking for opportunities for her members to perform service-oriented projects. They started with small projects such as community clean up days and raking leaves. Once the community knew of their willingness to help the community, the Chapter members were approached to help out in a variety of ways. Those activities include hosting a Halloween Carnival, ringing bells for the Salvation Army, organizing an Easter Egg Hunt, painting house numbers on curbs, and so much more. On average the FBLA Chapter gives over one thousand hours of time yearly to the school and community. Her community service goes beyond FBLA. She served as an Awana Group leader, is a non-paid technology consultant for a local parochial school, a volunteer instructor for adult computer education classes, and a YMCA coach. 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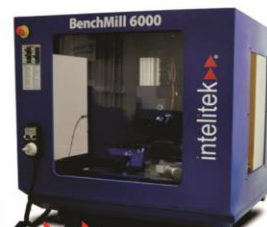

## CTE and Senate Priorities Determined by ACTE

The Association for Career and Technical Education has shared the following priorities in regards to CTE legislation.

### ACTE/Advance CTE Priorities

- Increase equitable access to high quality CTE
- Require greater coordination between planning, spending, and accountability
- Prioritize and strengthen connections between secondary and postsecondary education
- Emphasize increased engagements with employers
- Streamline the law to increase clarity and consistency
- Align the law, to the extent appropriate, with other federal education and workforce development legislation

### Senate Priorities

- Support the expansion of public/private collaborations with secondary and post-secondary programs, including alignment with state or locally-determined in-demand industries and occupations
- Support efforts to integrate into and strengthen career pathways at the state and local levels
- Address unfunded programs
- Improve evaluation and research to support innovation and best practices
- Make it easier for states and locals to run their CTE programs to serve all students who desire to gain access to CTE coursework, including students with disabilities
- Increase access to, and support of, career counseling or all CTE students
- Maintain CTE as a formula program



## FCCLA National Leadership Conference Draws Record Number of Youth Leaders from Across the Country

*More than 8,500 students and advisers converged for inspiration, training and opportunities to make a difference locally and across the country*

**August 3, 2016** – Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) brought more than 8,000 of its student leaders, members and advisers to San Diego, California July 3<sup>rd</sup>-7<sup>th</sup> to participate in its National Leadership Conference. Nebraska was well represented by over 300 students, advisers, and guests.

The conference provided opportunities for students and advisers to come together to learn about new initiatives in the organization, hear from inspiring speakers, as well as to expand leadership skills, sharpen talents and explore career pathways. The theme of this year's conference was "EMPOWER MEPOWER" and attendees were challenged to discover and grow their potential to make change in their local communities, schools, and families.

In addition to the many learning and networking experiences offered at the conference, more than 35 Family and Consumer Sciences competitive events, also known as STAR (Students Taking Action with Recognition) Events were offered to more than 5,100 event participants. Nebraska members came home with 100 Gold medals, 58 Silver Medals, and 4 Bronze medals and had multiple individuals and teams score in the top 10 nationally.
